Understanding the books of the Prophets

Role of the prophet

A prophet is a “mouthpiece” of God. His mission was to reveal to God’s people what God thought of their actions, what he wanted them to do, and what he was planning to do. Prophets were found throughout Israel’s history. A significant number of writing prophets emerged at the end of the Old Testament era.

Nature of the contents






The prophetic books are generally a collection of sermons. Some of the books have narrative sections and the entire book of Jonah is narrative. There are also descriptions of visions. However, most of the contents consist of speeches or sermons written, and possibly spoken, by the prophets. There is usually not a chronological or thematic order to them. They are a collection of sermons much like the collection of audio sermons on the church’s website. Take each sermon on its own. The chapter divisions generally mark one sermon from another.

Themes of the O.T. prophets

- God is the Lord of history and ruler of all nations.
- The Israelites are God’s covenant people.
- The Israelites are guilty of rebellion.
- A judgment is coming or has come.
- God loves and wants to show mercy to his people.
- God calls his people to repentance.
- God has a plan to restore his people.
- God has a plan to send a Savior and Ruler for all people.
- God’s kingdom will be triumphant.

*The Lord, the God of their fathers, sent persistently to them by his messengers, because he had compassion on his people and on his dwelling place. But they kept mocking the messengers of God, despising his words and scoffing his prophets, until the wrath of the Lord rose against his people, until there was no remedy.
(2 Chronicles 36:15-16)*

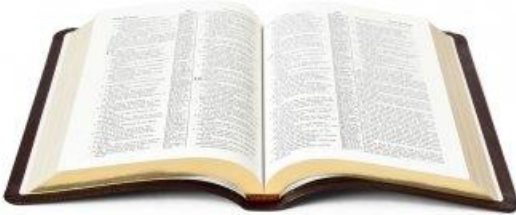

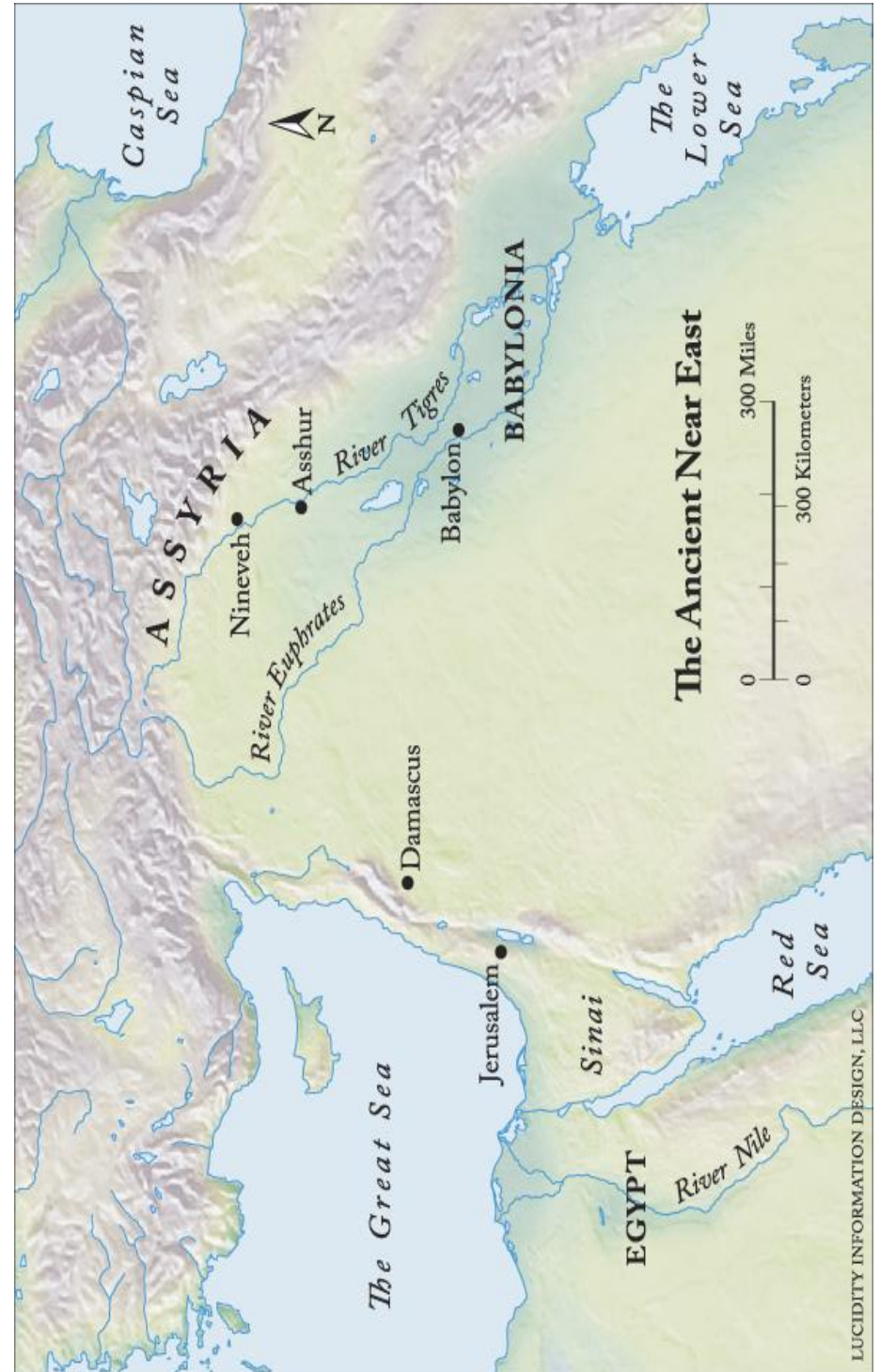

Summary of the Old Testament Writing Prophets

Biblical Order

Isaiah – The prophet explores in-depth the nature of God, his judgment, and his salvation.

Jeremiah and Lamentations – Having witnessed God’s judgment on Jerusalem by the Babylonians, the prophet vividly depicts the cost of disobedience while also pointing to a new covenant.

Ezekiel – Exiled in Babylon, God communicates to the captives through this prophet the bad news of Jerusalem’s fall but also the hope of resurrection for God’s people.

Daniel – Employed in both the Babylonian and Persian courts, this captive exemplifies a pure faith amid a godless culture while revealing visions of God’s great work to come.

Hosea – God reveals his heartbreak over his people through the heartbreak of the prophet.

Joel – God has and will judge his people for their sins, but the prophet announces that a day of restoration is coming.

Amos – The prophet from Judah delivers fiery rebukes for the idolatry and selfish indulgences of those in Israel.

Obadiah – The prophet declares that Edom will be judged for their opportunistic abuse of God’s people.

Jonah – The prophet must learn that God desires to save even the wicked Assyrians.

Micah – The prophet speaks stern rebukes to the rulers and oppressors in Israel and Judah and points to a day when God will invite all nations to his holy mountain.

Nahum – The prophet pronounces, with vivid language, a stunning judgement on Assyria.

Habakkuk – Though God’s people may struggle to understand his judgment, the prophet calls upon the reader to trust and rejoice in the Lord, nonetheless.

Zephaniah – The prophet announces three impending events: judgment on Judah, judgment on Judah’s enemies, and the restoration of God’s people.

Haggai – The prophet admonishes the returned Jews and encourages them to rebuild.

Zechariah – The prophet assures the returned Jews that God still works among them and for them.

Malachi – A stern rebuke is delivered by the prophet to the returned exiles for their lack of true devotion in serving God.

“When this comes—and come it will!— then they will know that a prophet has been among them.” (Ezekiel 33:33)
